## PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

Current research is showing links between trauma in childhood and poor lifetime physical and psychological outcomes, including at the end of life and during bereavement. Dr. Crunk and Dr. Burke will discuss their research findings and clinical implications of the relation between adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) and complicated grief in bereaved adults and offer some recommendations for intervention. They will also provide ways to incorporate trauma assessment and intervention into bereavement settings.

**Elizabeth Crunk, PhD** is a mental health counselor and an Assistant Professor of Counseling at the George Washington University in Washington, DC. She specializes in treating diverse issues in grief and bereavement, including complicated grief, anticipatory grief, non-death loss, and life transitions.

**Laurie A. Burke, PhD** specializes in complicated grief, traumatic loss, anticipatory grief, and spiritual distress in bereavement. Her research and training also include working with palliative care patients and their caregivers who are facing end-of-life issues and addressing the needs of family members and friends as they anticipate the loss of their terminally ill loved one.
